Reconciliation Australia, established in 2001 is the lead body for reconciliation in Australia.

Reconciliation Australia is an independent not-for-profit organisation promoting and facilitating reconciliation by building relationships, respect and trust between the wider Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The Lutheran Church of Australia has an established partnership with Reconciliation Australia through the development of its first Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), endorsed August 2020. Copies of the LCA RAP (Reconciliation Action Plan) will be available early September.

Share Our Pride is an online tool, hosted by Reconciliation Australia, designed to take you on an awareness raising journey.

'Share Our Pride' will give you a glimpse of how life looks from an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspective by responding to such questions as

Who are the First Australians?

What special connection do Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders have to the Land?

Why does the past matter today? Can't we just put it behind us?

What are some of First Nations people's strengths, joys and victories?

What are some keys to connecting well with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples?

How have First Nations people contributed to Australia today?

It works through material in a certain order so each chapter builds on the last. You'll get a small taste of traditional cultures and learn a little about our shared history.
